# How to “Zoom”

Doreen Gowans, National Communications Chairperson, shared the following information regarding how to use “Zoom”.



## Set up Zoom:

Google search for Zoom and download it. Once it is downloaded, you are ready to start.

## How to Use Zoom:

1. Click the **Zoom** icon, which opens Zoom to the Home page, which should have four blocks (one red and three blue) and a date and time banner. If not, then go to the top of the screen and click on **Home**.
2. Click on the **Schedule** block to set up a meeting.
3. “Schedule Meeting” then opens.
4. Enter a date and time, then go to the bottom of screen, select **Other** Calendars, then Save. (For those with Google calendar, the screen will differ).
5. A new screen appears, “Your Meeting Has been Scheduled”.
6. Click on “**Copy to Clipboard**”.
7. Open your email and paste the meeting invitation to your message. Enter those you want to invite in the recipient line and send. (All those you have entered will receive this message with the invitation link attached).
8. Go back to Zoom, select the meeting you scheduled (under **Date & Time**) and click **Start**.
9. When the meeting is started, your video and microphone may not be **on**. Go to the bottom of the screen and click on the icons to turn them on.
10. Once the participants start to access the meeting, you will have to admit them by clicking on their name (right side or top of screen).
11. You may experience having approximately 30 minutes for your meeting. You will be notified that you have one or two minutes left. If you require more time, ask participants to leave and re-enter using the original e-mail link to re-join.

## For Participants:

1. Open your e-mail and click on the Zoom **invitation** link, which may appear in blue.
2. The person who invited (host) will then **admit** you to the meeting.
3. Most controls are at the bottom of the screen.
  - a. On the bottom left side of the screen are the **Audio** and **Video** icons. If a red line is through an icon it means it is turned off. Click on the icon to turn it on.
  - b. The **View** screen icon is at the top right. Select **Gallery** to see everybody.
  - c. When you want to leave a meeting, select **Leave** at the bottom right side of the screen.

Give it a try and have fun with Zoom.

## March List of Recommended Reads



### 1. *Barometer Rising* – Hugh MacLennan

A romantic-realist novel that takes place during WW I and the Halifax Explosion of December 1917. Relief efforts were hampered the following day that blanketed Halifax with 16 inches of snow, telegraph lines were knocked down. Halifax was isolated by the storm. Intertwined with the Halifax explosion is the romantic life of Penny Wain.

### 2. *The Women of the Passion* - Kathleen Murphy

The stories of women who accompanied Jesus during his last days and were there as he endured his agony and death on the cross. Each reflection shows how much we know about these women and what they have to share.

### 3. *A Year in a BnB in Banff* – Jamie MacVicar

What happens when an American man meets a loveable Canadian who just happens to own a B&B in Banff? With a foot in both cultures, and comparisons aplenty, MacVicar takes the reader on an often hilarious, sometimes poignant, and always-illuminating journey.

### 4. *On Being Jewish* – Julie Neuberger

Rabbi Neuberger's work describes what it's like to be Jewish in contemporary Britain. It clarifies Jewish attitudes to life and death, sex, the Holocaust, families, festivals and rituals, and tries to show how these issues fit into the Britain of today.

5. *WINing: The Trials, Tribulations and Triumphs of Opening a Women's Shelter* Marsha Mildon details the history of the extraordinary women who helped start Edmonton Women's Shelter, which later became WIN House. It's a story of challenge and change, setbacks and successes, against the odds.

6. *The Rosary of the Seven Sorrows* – Booklet detailing how to pray the Seven Sorrows Rosary

### 7. *Rome Sweet Home: Our Journey to Catholicism*– Scott & Kimberly Hahn

The Hahns' deep love and knowledge of Christ and of Scripture is evident and contagious throughout their story. Their love of truth and of neighbor is equally evident, and their theological focus on the great importance of the family, both biological and spiritual, will be a source of inspiration for all readers.

### 8. *Journey to Self: Discovering Paths Beyond My Dreams* – Barry Hampshire

Offering the reader more than the excitement of travels and adventures in 1977 Europe and the Middle East, Barry Hampshire's engaging memoir examines the formative moments that helped him to mature and to design his life from the inside out bringing him spiritual joy.

### 9. *Curveballs*– Catherine Mardon (from Edmonton)

When a young idealistic Catholic attorney decides to take on the leader of a white supremacist training camp, she has no idea how far she will have to go, and how much it will eventually cost her. A true story of faith in the face of adversity.
