May God bring peace upon all who have suffered the injustices of this wounded world.


Finally she spoke, "daddy, did God make you?"

CWL BYOB Reading Club May List of Recommended Reads

1. *The Book of Lost Names* by Kristin Harmel

Inspired by an astonishing true story from World War II, a young woman with a talent for forgery helps hundreds of Jewish children flee the Nazis by creating forged documents.

2. *I am my Father's Son* by Dan Hill (Canadian Author)

Through vivid family stories, letters, memories and his own award-winning lyrics, Dan Hill tells the story of two parallel lives—his father's in mid-20th-century America and his own as a young black man coming of age in suburban Canada—and the stormy but ultimately loving way each of those lives affected the other.

3. *Best of Season's Menu Cookbook* by Judy Schultz (Alberta Author)

This book is full of tempting and imaginative menus for all seasons.

4. *Wild: From Lost to Found on the Pacific Coast Trail* by Cheryl Strayed

After the death of her mother, her family scattered, and her marriage destroyed, she hiked the Pacific Crest Trail alone. A journey that maddened, strengthened, and healed her.

5. *The Things We Cannot Say* by Kelly Rimmer

In 1942, Europe remains in the relentless grip of war. Just beyond the tents of the Russian refugee camp she calls home, a young woman speaks her wedding vows. It's a decision that will alter her destiny...and it's a lie that will remain buried until the next century.

6. *The Diplomat's Wife* by Pam Jenoff

This novel begins as WW II is ending. Marta has been in prison and tortured to try to get information about the resistance group that she was part of. The prison is liberated by the American Army. Marta marries a British diplomat and returns to Poland to find the traitor.

7. *The Winter Sea* by Susanna Kearsly (Canadian Author)

The novel is fiction based on facts and takes place in Scotland. While visiting Slains Castle, Carrie deals with her ancestral memory and come to know the truth the exiled James Stewart of Scotland.

8. *The Answer Is ...Reflections on My Life* by Alex Trebek (Canadian Author)

The long time Jeopardy host recounts his life and relationships, as well as his work in television.

9. *The Bishop's Man* by Linden ManIntyre (Canadian Author)

The story follows a Catholic priest who became so successful at resolving potential church scandals quickly and quietly that he had to accept a position at a remote parish in Cape Breton to give himself a low profile.

10. *Consecration of St Joseph* by Fr. Donald Callaway

Consecration to St. Joseph is dedicated to meeting the challenges of the present moment and restoring order to our Church and our world, all through the potent paternal intercession and care of St. Joseph

11. *Descartes' Dream* by P. Davis & R. Hersh

This book takes examines the physical and intellectual influences of mathematics on society, particularly in light of technological advances. (NOTE: Only read this if you really like math!)
